Strong and Vulnerable

The year 2022 for OPAL was marked by significant achievements, and yet also revealed vulnerabilities.

Let's start with major achievements, all of which were made possible by grants and donations from you and people like you who value our community of islanders.

In 2022 the OPAL team ...

- Purchased and started renovation of Northern Heights, a building with 12 one-bedroom apartments across from the library;
- Continued renovation of the seven apartments on Mt. Baker Road that OPAL purchased in 2021;
- Commenced designs and funding for a new neighborhood of 10 ownership homes on Kidder Way;
- Collaborated with the Community Foundation, Community Resource Center and Food Bank to enter into a purchase agreement for property on Pea Patch Lane where we hope to build more rental housing and locate a permanent home for the Food Bank and Community Resource Center;
- Entered into an agreement with the Puget Sound Cooperative Credit Union to explore a joint project for more rental housing;
- Facilitated the sale by four OPAL homeowners of their houses at an affordable price to four families who now have stable housing;

- Loaned funds to a long-time islander to enable him to build a home where he can live instead of in an R.V. and barn; and
- Facilitated the painting or re-roofing of OPAL homes with contractors who were hired by homeowners.

OPAL has been blessed by numerous long-time staff (four of whom have been with OPAL for more than 15 years). Historically, employees have filled multiple roles, but as OPAL grows, newer staff members will be more specialized. After six years working for OPAL, Orgelina Weiss retired, and after one year Tara Anderson also departed. We welcomed Jen Krauss as Accounting Specialist and rounded out

OPAL's work in 2022 was greatly enhanced by a new program from Washington State that provided technical assistance to rural communities. The consultants facilitated meetings on the Pea Patch Lane property and are helping write grant applications.

Software applications can be great tools, except ... In 2022 OPAL experienced a rocky migration to a new accounting system.

We are still — in the spring of 2023 — working through that change.

When the transition is complete the new accounting system will increase efficiency and enhance reporting on OPAL's complex financials.

Thankfully, we had a very successful transition to a new online application tool. Instead of people who apply to buy a home needing to make paper copies of verification information, homebuyers can now

upload information into OPAL's database where it is stored on a secure server.

The OPAL acronym stands for "Of People And Land." As the demand for OPAL's services increases, we are striving to provide services to nurture our island People, to care for the Land entrusted to us, and to build homes that endure. Our ability to do that successfully in the future depends on you. On your connections with others. And on your contributions of time and treasure. Thank you for sharing this journey.
